Bureau of Social Science Research Washington, D.C.

(1990 M Street, N.W., Washington, DC 20036)

Transition to Retirement: The Employer's Perspec-

tive. Funded by the Pew Memorial Trust, this study examined current retirement trends, changes in workforce composition, and policies and practices of employers with regard to older workers, including work options for older workers and pre-retirement planning services. Telephone interviews were conducted in October-November 1983 with 466 employers of 250 or more persons nationwide, with a 71% response rate. The final report is to be published in fall 1985.

Capstone Poll University of Alabama

(University of Alabama, P.O. Box 587, University, AL 35486)

Completed project:

quality of Life in the Greater Birmingham Area. The purpose of this study for the Birmingham News was to examine citizens' attitudes about the overall quality of life within the Greater Birmingham (Alabama) area and the quality of specific aspects such as government and public services, crime and safety, transportation, health care, housing, the education system, social and cultural resources, race relations, and the economy. Random-digit-dialed (RDD) telephone interviews were completed in May 1985 with 411 adults living in the Greater Birmingham area, for a 74% response rate. Study director: Patrick Cotter.

Center for Social Research City University of New York

(33 West 42nd Street, Room 625, New York, NY 10036)

Geriatric Care. This small telephone survey of geriatrics experts and medical practitioners examines the characteristics of office care of the elderly and payment for geriatric care. Conducted in collaboration with Dr. Marianne C. Fahs of the Department of Community Medicine, Mt. Sinai School of Medicine, the survey is being done for a national conference on payment for geriatric services, funded by NCHSR and sponsored by the Mt. Sinai Department of Geriatics and Adult Medicine. The interviews of the practitioners will be carried out by the National Opinion Research Center. Principal investigator: Charlotte Muller.

Center for Survey Research University of Massachusetts-Boston

(100 Arlington Street, Boston, MA 02116)

Survey of Community Needs. Analysis begins in fall 1985 in this study for the United Community Planning Corporation, funded by the Permanent Charity Fund, to provide up-to-date data relevant to needs for social services and to giving to United Way. RDD telephone interviews were completed in the summer of 1985 with 940 adults (18+) in the Boston SMSA, with a 59% response rate. Study director: Floyd J. Fowler.

Elderly Abuse and Neglect. Funded by the National Institute on Aging, this study for the Family Violence Laboratory, University of New Hampshire, seeks to identify family situations and circumstances that contribute to verbal and physical abuse and neglect of the elderly. Data collection, to be completed in fall 1985, involves approximately 2,000 screening interviews with persons over 65 in the Boston SMSA and 200 follow-up interviews with abused and neglected elderly. Individuals living with children and other family members will be oversampled. Interviews will be primarily by telephone, with face-to-face methods used when telephone numbers are not available. Evaluation of Drunk Driving Laws in Maine and Massachusetts. The current round of surveys, conducted for the Boston University School of Public Health under funding from the National Institute on Alcoholism and Alcohol Abuse and the Commonwealth Fund, is part of a continuing effort to monitor the impact of changes in the drunk driving laws in Maine and Massachusetts. Data have been collected from a sample of residents before the laws were changed and for several years thereafter. collection has involved 1,000 adults in Maine and Massachusetts, 1,000 teenagers (aged 16-19) in those two states, and 1,250 adults in the rest of New England to serve as a control. The RDD telephone interviews gather data on driving, drinking, accidents, and perceptions about the enforcement of laws. Response rates have ranged from 72% (adults) to 89% (teens).

Center for Survey Research and Methodology (ZUMA) Mannheim, West Germany

(P.O. Box 5969, 6800 Mannheim 1, West Germany)

Allgemeine Bevölkerkungsumfrage der Sozialwissenschaften (ALLBUS)--The German General Social Survey. Funded by the Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft (German Science Foundation), the ALLBUS is a multitopic survey for general use in social science research and teaching. Main topics have included politics (1980), religion and belief systems (1982), and social inequality and attitudes toward the welfare state (1984). The 1986 survey will focus on education, competence in managing daily life situations, and social networks and support systems. All questionnaires include the ZUMA basic

background items, and parts of the data are comparable with data from the NORC General Social Survey. In each survey, face-to-face interviews are conducted with approximately 3,000 individuals of German nationality aged 18 or over and residing in private households in the Federal Republic of Germany or West Berlin. Response rates are about 70% for each survey.

Completed project:

International Social Survey Program (ISSP) 1985. Completed in August 1985, this pilot study of a series of international comparative studies was incorporated into a large-scale methodological experiment in which results from some small-scale mail surveys were tested in a nationwide representative mail survey. The study involved 1,049 members of the general population in West Germany, including West Berlin, with a 42% response rate. The next international survey will be part of the ALLBUS 1986 (see above). Countries involved in these surveys include Australia, Great Britain, Germany, and the United States.

Division of Sociomedical Sciences Columbia University School of Public Health

Changing Tasks of Networks over Life Cycle of Elderly. Funded by the National Institute on Aging, this 20-month study, scheduled for completion in January 1987, is a follow-up of the same elderly population studied in 1978 to see if predictions based on the cross-sectional sample hold. Predictions were made on the changing composition of one's helping network with changes in health status and on the relation between support groups and mortality. Telephone interviews will be conducted with 400 older people (73+) in the New York City area and in the Miami and Ft. Lauderdale areas in Florida.

Institute for Governmental Service University of Maryland

FY 1986 Compensation Survey: Maryland Local Governments. The purpose of this survey, to be completed in the spring of 1986, is to determine the wage and compensation policies prevalent in the state of Maryland. The study involves mail questionnaires sent to all counties and a sample of municipalities statewide.

Study director: Victor R. Tervala.

User Fees Study of Maryland Municipal Governments. This study, sponsored by the Institute for Governmental Service (IGS) and the Maryland Municipal League (MML), examines the use, including pros and cons, of utilizing user fees within incorporated

municipalities in Maryland. The study will include theory of user fee usage and impact on budgets and service in the municipalities. Schoduled for completion in December 1985, the study involves mail questionnaires from 154 incorporated municipalities in the state, with a 74% response rate. Study directors: Brian M. Gardner (IGS) and James Peck (MML).

A Study of Elected and Appointed County Treasurers. This project, to be completed in summer 1986, seeks to determine the number of elected vs. appointed treasurers in county government and to elicit trends in these positions that might be linked to growth in population, service increases, and demand for trained professionals. The study involves mail questionnaires sent to the chief administrative officer in 20% of the counties in selected southern states.

Completed project:

City of Hagerstown (Maryland) Citizens Survey. Completed in July 1985 for the City of Hagerstown, this mail questionnaire study sought to determine the viewpoints of a random sample of 1,100 residents (both property owners and renters) of the city regarding various city services and functions. The response rate, with only one mailing and no follow-up, was 26%.

Institute for Policy Research University of Cincinnati

(Mail Location 132, University of Cincinnati, Cincinnati, OH 45221)

Budget Priority Survey. The three major purposes of this survey for the City of Cincinnati are to evaluate city services, provide citizen input to the 1986-88 city budgets, and investigate various policy issues. The survey involves RDD telephone interviews with 1,000 adults (18+) in Cincinnati. Principal investigator: Alfred J. Tuchfarber.

Greater Cineinnati Survey. This multi-client omnibus survey, conducted since 1978 in Hamilton County (Cincinnati), Ohio, by IPR's Behavioral Sciences Laboratory, is now being expanded to the eight-county Greater Cincinnati region. The survey has been used by numerous public and private sector clients, averaging 8-10 per survey. Each survey involves RDD telephone interviews with approximately 1,700 adults in the Greater Cincinnati CSA. Project director: George F. Bishop.

Alternative School Planning Survey III. Completed in May 1985, this was the third in a series of surveys to assist the Cincinnati Board of Education in designing and selecting alternative (magnet) school programs. RDD telephone interviews were conducted with 1,714 parents of primary and middle school children in the Cincinnati School District, with a 76% response rate.

Institute for Social Research University of Michigan

(P.O. Box 1248, Ann Arbor, MI 48106)

Life Events in Everyday Experience. This NIMH-funded research seeks to study the determinants of sex differences in nonspecific psychological distress and psychiatric caseness in the noninstitutionalized population. The study combines the assessment of role-related stresses with a special focus on the role of network life events, as well as personal life events, on psychological distress. Data collection, to be completed in October 1985, involves face-to-face interviews with approximately 700 white, currently married couples (two respondents per household) living in suburban Detroit. Principal investigator: Ronald C. Kessler.

Monitoring the Future: A Continuing Study of the Lifestyles and Values of Youth. Begun in 1975, this ongoing annual series of surveys of the nation's high school seniors is completing its llth annual survey this year. Panel studies of all graduating classes from 1975 forward are also being continued on an annual basis in this cohort-sequential research design. Funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, the study is an important source of social indicators on smoking, drinking, and illicit drug use of many types. Variables include these and others such as education- and workrelated attitudes and plans, use of leisure time, sex-role-related and social attitudes, attitudes toward social institutions, delinquency, victimization, self-esteem, and happiness. Annual hardbound volumes presenting complete univariate and bivariate statistics are available through the TSR Publications Division. A series of eight GPO-published monographs on trends in drug use in high school since 1975 is available from the principal investigators, as is a list of other publications from the study.

Completed projects:

Bereaved Survivors. This recent study, funded by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, examined the process of grieving the loss of a family member in a motor vehicle accident. Respondents included a bereaved group of 94 persons who had lost either a spouse or a child in such an accident four to seven years earlier, and a matched control group. The interview gathered information on the respondents' current functioning by measuring such variables as depression and other psychiatric symptoms, social functioning, psychological well-being, and future worries and concerns. Southeast Asian Refugees. In this three-year study of Southeast Asian refugees now living in the U.S., face-to-face interviews were conducted in the summer and fall of 1982 with almost 1,400 refugee households in five areas--Houston, Chicago, Boston, Seattle, and Orange County, California. Since the sample population was 50% Vietnamese, 30% Laotian, and 20% Chinese Vietnamese, interviewers from these three ethnic groups used a tri-lingual question-

naire. The study was funded by the U.S. Office of Refugee Resettlement and the Office of the Secretary for Planning and Evaluation, DHIS, to assess both national and regional refugee resettlement policies and programs. For further information, contact Nathan Caplan at TSR.

Institute for Social Science Research University of California at Los Angeles

June Graduate Survey. Conducted for the Placement and Career Planning Center, UCLA, and scheduled for completion in January 1986, this survey is a follow-up of graduates to assess how effective their degree/education was in obtaining an employment position in their field of study and to ascertain starting salary, relevance, and future plans. The study involves mail questionnaires from approximately 3,000 UCLA graduates in 1985. Project director: Ruth Parsell.

Pamily Planning Survey of Low-Income Women. This NIH-funded study for the Division of Research in Medical Education, University of Southern California, seeks to determine (1) family planning service needs of low-income women who have not used a service for three years or more and (2) birth control methods used, if any, satisfaction with current methods, and reasons for non-use of clinics. In this survey, scheduled for completion in October 1986, face-to-face interviews will be conducted in Los Angeles with 450 females (150 each of blacks, Anglos, and Hispanics) aged 18-44 who are non-users of family planning services and not sterile. Principal investigator: Robert Mendenball.

Institute for Survey Research Temple University

National Household Survey of Drugs. The purpose of this survey for the National Institute on Drug Abuse and the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism is to provide reliable prevalence and incidence estimates of nonmedical drug use in 1985 of specific classes of substances for the population as a whole and by subgroups of interest and to provide trend analysis for the data collected since 1971. Face-to-face interviews (in English and Spanish) are being conducted with a probability sample of 8,000 members of the general population age 12 or older (2,000 blacks, 2,000 Hispanics, and 4,000 others) in the 48 contiguous states. Project director: Leonard LoSciuto.

Effectiveness of Methadone Maintenance Treatment: Client Outcome and Program Services. The objective of this one-year project, funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse and scheduled for completion August 31, 1986, is to advance current knowledge about the effectiveness of methadone maintenance treatment. The project is designed to ascertain which patients profit most (and least) from methadone maintenance and to identify those aspects of the treatment programs that effect the desired changes. Face-to-face interviews will be

conducted with 600 admissions (established and new) to six methadone maintenance treatment facilities in New York, Philadelphia, and Baltimore.

Study of Puerto Rican Delinguency in the South Bronx. This NIMH-funded study aims to uncover the factors that explain why some Puerto Rican adolescents in the South Bronx in New York engage in delinquency and others manage to avoid involvement in delinquency even though they share a high-risk urban environment. Scheduled for completion in July 1987, the two-year study will involve face-toface interviews with 1,000 male Puerto Rican youth (aged 12-19) living in the South Bronx and 1,000 parents/guardians of the interviewed youth.

Completed project:

Visits to Ambulatory Art Exhibitions. The purpose of this study, completed in March 1985 for the Israel Museum, was to examine the motives for visiting two ambulatory exhibitions sponsored by the Museum, their contribution to the development of knowledge and understanding and to the pleasure of visitors, and visitors' inclination to visit museums in the future. Also examined was the usefulness of activities conducted prior to and during the exhibition for predicting the contribution of the visit. Self-administered questionnaires were completed by 980 individuals (mainly school pupils) plus 36 accompanying teachers and leaders of groups of children who visited the exhibitions in the town of Dimona and kibbutz Ein Harod.

Mathematica Policy Research Princeton, New Jersey

Analysis of Work Search among Unemployment Insurance Claimants. Scheduled for completion in February 1987, the purpose of this project for the U.S. Department of Labor is to evaluate the impact of state laws, regulations, and procedures, specifically those pertaining to work search requirements, on (1) the amount of UI benefits collected, (2) denial rates, (3) payment error rates, (4) job search activity, and (5) job market outcomes. Telephone interviews, to be completed in the spring of 1986, will be conducted with a list sample of 3,000 former unemployment insurance claimants in eight states.

Survey of Mid-level Banking Customers in North Carolina. This survey for a leading North Carolina bank seeks to evaluate the needs of mid-level commercial bank customers. Telephone interviews will be conducted with approximately 500 mid-level (in sales) commercial bank customers in North Carolina. Survey director: Todd Ensor.

Focus Groups and Survey of Retail and Commerical This study for a Michigan bank Bank Customers. seeks to determine the relative position of the bank in relation to other banks competing in the Michigan area. Using both the telephone and focus groups, 600 interviews are to be completed with retail (household) and commercial bank customers and noncustomers.

Design for an Evaluation of the Impacts of Job Corps Components. The purpose of this project, completed in September 1985 for the Employment and Training Administration, USDL, was to design an evaluation, including a survey component, to determine whether the Job Corps is the most cost-effective program for serving the disadvantaged youth who currently participate, or whether these youth could be served more cost effectively through alternative educational and training programs. Options ranged from 17,000 to 38,000 interviews nationwide over a four-year period with Job Corps enrollees and a comparison group sample, with both face-to-face and telephone methods proposed. Project director and co-principal investigator: John Burghardt; co-principal investigator: Walter

Corson; co-principal: Charles Metcalf; survey director: John Homrighausen.

Evaluation of the Simplified Application Demonstration Project. Completed in September 1985 for the Food and Nutrition Service, USDA, this was an cvaluation of a demonstration designed to (1) reduce administrative costs and error rates by allowing households containing members participating in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), or Medicaid programs to be categorically eligible for food stamps if they meet the income limits and nonfinancial requirements for the Food Stamp Program and (2) test the use of standardized benefits for project-eligible participants. Telephone interviews (or face-to-face when necessary) were conducted with a list sample of 3,650 households receiving AFDC, SSI, or Medicaid benefits in seven selected sites in California, Illinois, and Oklahoma. Project director and principal investigator: James C. Ohls.

Datacable Surveys. The first of these surveys for a major financial information supplier, completed in July 1985, evaluated the commerical demand for an information service to be delivered over cable television lines and accessible by personal com-Telephone interviews were conducted with 104 commerical organizations in Pittsburgh, with a 53% response rate. The second survey, completed in September 1985, measured the interest and demand among households for such an electronic information service. Telephone interviews were conducted with 194 households with cable television and personal

computers in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Boston, New York, and Pittsburgh.

Minnesota Center for Social Research University of Minnesota

Minnesota Fall Survey. The topics of this year's omnibus survey, sponsored by about 10 agencies and companies and scheduled for completion in December 1985, include quality of life, migration, community health, crime and police, housing, employment, and environmental quality. RDD telephone interviews will be conducted with 2,000 adults (18+) residing in Minnesota.

Continuous Survey of Outdoor Recreation. This study for the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources seeks to describe the participation and associated expenditures of Minnesota residents in outdoor recreation. Scheduled for completion in October 1986, the study involves RDD telephone interviews (using CATI) with 5,600 households in Minnesota over 12 months, with 13 interviews conducted each day.

National Opinion Research Center University of Chicago

(6030 S. Ellis Avenue, Chicago, IL 60637)

National Ambulatory Medical Care Survey (NAMCS), 1985. This is the 10th survey for the National Center for Health Statistics designed to meet the need for statistical information on the provision of ambulatory medical care services in office-based practice in the U.S. Based on a modified national probability sample of 3,700 physicians in office-based practice (lists supplied by AMA and AOA), the physicians are screened for eligibility by telephone and then given a personal induction interview in which information about the physician and the practice is collected. Data are collected by means of a Patient Record Form filled in by the physician over a week's time. The one-year survey is scheduled for completion in February 1986.

Community Cancer Care Evaluation (CCCE). Sponsored by the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center, Seattle, under funding from the National Cancer Institute, this study assesses the effectiveness of the Community Clinical Oncology Program (CCOP), which provides up-to-date cancer treatment management techniques to cancer patients who are treated in their own communities. The study seeks to determine the level of community participation, changes in patient care and in the health care delivery system as a result of CCOP, and the factors that contribute to the success of the programs that are working well. The purpose is to investigate the knowledge, attitudes, and practice of physicians in communities where CCOP exists. Scheduled for completion in April 1986, the study involves two waves of telephone interviews using CATI conducted with a total of 3,000 physicians in 12 areas (8 with CCOP and 4 without), including all physicians in CCOP and other oncologists and specialists in the sites. Principal investigator: Polly Feigl (Hutchinson); project director: Shirley Knight (NORC).

Survey of Absent Parents Pilot Study. This pilot study for the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation (ASPE), DHHS, seeks to learn more about the characteristics of absent parents who have no obligations to make child support payments, as well as those who are not making payments on existing obligations, in order to determine their reasons for not supporting their children. Objectives are to provide a reliable sociometric and demographic profile of the absent parent population, to determine factors explaining payment performance of those with obligations, and to find out why obligations are established in some cases and not in others. The pilot, being conducted in August 1985-January 1986, involves face-to-face interviews with about 600 absent and custodial parents in three counties in Ohio and Florida and records extraction from court records. NORC is providing management on the study, and the Urban Institute is responsible for design and analysis. NORC project director: Mary O'Brien; ASPS project officer: Linda Mellgren.

Chicago Cardia Study. In this study, to be completed in May 1986 for Northwestern University and funded by the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, a sample of 1,100 young adults (aged 18-30) in Chicago will be interviewed on such topics as smoking and health and then given a physical examination. The purpose is to enhance understanding between life style and health among certain population groups, including young blacks and men and women in varying SES groups, in order to document changes over time and explain how life style may relate to the development of heart disease in later life and to suggest possible strategies for more effective prevention of disease before life styles become well established. Using RDD telephoning, NORC will recruit respondents for a self-administered questionnaire and a health examination. Principal investigator: Kaing Lui (Northwestern); project director: Shirley Knight (NORC).

Survey of Students in Management Schools (The New Matriculants Survey). The purpose of this survey, to be completed in May 1986 for the Graduate Management Admission Council (GMAC), is to collect information from newly matriculated students in business and management master's degree programs. The mail questionnaires sent to 3,500 students (35 each in 100 schools nationwide) cover such topics as demographic characteristics, family background, finances, career plans, school choice, values, and attitudes.

Care of Dental Patients at Risk of Endocarditis. Conducted for the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, this study seeks to ascertain the level of knowledge at the dental clinician level about the diagnosis and prevention of bacterial endocarditis in patients at risk. Scheduled for completion in January 1987, a list sample of 1,000 dentists

nationwide will be screened by telephone, using CATI, and about 550 will be interviewed. Principal investigator: Donald Sadowsky (Einstein); project director: Shirley Knight (NORC).

Study of the Long-term Impact of Military Experience on Low-Aptitude Youth. Sponsored by the Human Resources Research Organization (HumRRO) under funding from the U.S. Department of the Navy, this study, to be completed in January 1986, is examining the post-military life experience of low-aptitude individuals who were recruited accidently into the military at a time when the Armed Services Vocational and Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) was administered in an incorrectly determined form. The experiences of these men will be compared with those of individuals appropriately recruited and with similar men who never entered the military. Use of Social Services by Chicago's Welfare Population. Study of Age-Related Differences in Cancer Management. The focus of the project is a dental care supplement to be administered as part of the 1986 National Health Interview Survey.

Cognitive Processes in Survey Responding: Attitudes

Tri-City Survey. This survey, conducted in March-May 1985 for the Florida League of Cities and the Florida Institute of Government, sought to ascertain citizen attitudes toward service delivery, taxes, and tax/service trade-offs in three Florida cities-Bartow, Bradenton, and Orlando. To determine the sources-in self-interest, political preferences and ideology, and community involvment-of these attitudes, RDD telephone interviews were conducted with 1,626 adults (18+) in these cities, with a 65% response rate.

Services in Support of National Cause of Death Scheduled for completion in October Evaluation. 1986 for the National Center for Health Statistics, this two-year study involves a pretest (conducted in March 1985) and a pilot study to develop and evaluate specific methods and instruments for measuring certification errors that will be used in a national study to estimate the quality of national cause-of-death statistics. For the pilot study, 700 death records will be selected from the Current Mortality Sample for Michigan, Wisconsin, and Pennsylvania. Mail questionnaires will be sent to the certifiers and selected medical providers who Based on the mail had treated the decedents. survey data, medical histories for the decedents will be compiled and then reviewed by medical experts, who will complete new medical certifications for comparison with the original certifications. The pilot study will also develop and test methods for determining the diagnostic certainty of the causes of death by asking medical providers to provide information about the procedures used to diagnose the causes of death listed on the certificate. The Expanding Market for Registered Products: Who Will Benefit? This multiple-sponsored project seeks to determine the best methods (visit to source, telephone, personal computer, ATM, visit to home, mail) to market a wide variety of registered

products. Consumers' attitudes toward supplemental sources of investment products such as banks, life insurance agents, and finanical planners are being investigated, as are the feelings of stockbrokers and insurance agents about the changing environment of the distribution of registered products. Using both telephone and personal interviews, data will be collected on 620 families referred to intensive home-based services in two states--Utah and Washington. A Prospective Study of the Frequency and Duration of Infant Feeding Practices among Primiparae. This 2 1/2 year study for the National Institute for Child Health and Human Development seeks (1) to understand those factors that contribute to a mother's decision to breast or bottle feed and identify factors contributing to breast feeding and prolonged lactation and (2) to learn more about the interrelationships between women's rationale for weaning and its timing. Survey to Assess the Prevalence, Attitudes, Knowledge, and Beliefs about Smoking Behavior among the Adult Population. This two-year study for the Office on Smoking and Health, DHHS, scheduled for completion in October 1986, seeks to ascertain present knowledge and attitudes toward smoking and prevalence of smoking among adults in the U.S. Specifically, the project will (1) determine current statistical data on the prevalence rates of the use of tobacco, particularly cigarettes; (2) ascertain demographic and attitudinal data on smo-

kers, former smokers, and nonsmokers; and (3) determine the extent and nature of changes that have taken place since 1975, when the last comprehensive examination of these smoking and health parameters was undertaken. In the first half of 1986, RDD telephone interviews using CATI will be conducted with a national household sample of 12,000 persons age 17 or over, with oversampling of former smokers and never smokers.

Linkage Studies. Westat is conducting two studies for the National Center for Health Statistics to evaluate the feasibility of linking the National Health Interview Survey (NHIS) to the Center's other population-based surveys:

l. The first study focuses on the linkage between the National Survey of Family Growth (NSFG) and NHIS. Several experimental treatments were tested in the fall of 1984, including type of sample unit (housing unit vs. selected person), mode of initial respondent contact (telephone vs. in-person), and number of elapsed months between the two surveys. Three dependent measures were used to evaluate the different treatments: response rates, level of effort, and costs. Preliminary analyses suggest reductions in cost associated with telephone contact without increases in refusals as well as further cost savings associated with selected-person samples. The final analytic report will be completed during the fall of 1985.

2. The second study, co-sponsored by NCHS and NCHSR&HCTA and conducted with the National Opinion Research Center, evaluates the feasibility of linking the National Medical Expenditure Survey (NMES) with NHIS. The first of the study's two components is a household survey (two rounds of interviews-one in the fall of 1985 and the second to be completed by February 1986) to evaluate different types of sample units, method of respondent initial contact, number of elapsed months between the NHIS and NMES, and mode of interviewing in the second round. Analysis will focus on response rates, level of effort, and costs. Following completion of the household component, medical providers identified by respondents will be contacted to verify the respondents' reports of utilization. This component consists of two experimental design features: a comparison of means for contact and obtaining information from the medical provider and an examination of the means by which the most reliable information can be obtained from the provider. The medical provider field work will be completed by the end of 1986.

Pilot Study of Interviews of Care Providers of Reye's Syndrome Cases and Controls. Sponsored by the Centers for Disease Control and the Food and Drug Administration, this study examined the possible epidemiologic relationship between Reye's Syndrome and medication. The study was designed to assess the relative merits and feasibility of alternative methodologies for case ascertainment and matching controls. Interviews were conducted in various sites across the U.S., including all hospitals in the states of Ohio, Oklahoma, and Minnesota with 20 or more pediatric beds and 16 Pediatric Tertiary Care Centers throughout the U.S. The interviews involved the Primary Care Provider for the case (usually a parent) and any Other Primary Care

Providers, as well as the Primary and Other Care Providers for each of two school-based controls and two community-based controls located by RDD in the same phone exchange as the case's home phone number. In-patient and emergency room control cases in the Pediatric Center sites were also identified and their primary care providers interviewed.

Epidemiology of Adolescent Introspection. Inis NIMH-funded project was part of a three-year study of adolescent health. The field work conducted by WSRL, which was completed in June 1985, involved telephone interviews using CATI with one of the parents or guardians of adolescent children in five selected school districts in New Jersey who had completed a self-administered questionnaire about their own health. The parent interview dealt with the parents' perspective of the child's health, their own health, socialization, an introspective analysis of personality, life stress factors, and family history of disease. HINDEX

A new health index data base (HINDEX) has been developed and published by the National Center for Health Statistics. This index was formed to facilitate the accession of data from the National Health and Nutrition Examination Surveys and the earlier National Health Examination Surveys conducted by NCHS during 1960-80. HINDEX is a guide to the data available on the public use tapes and their documentation to identify and locate data on specific topics. Each line of data in HINDEX contains information on an individual health item or a group of closely related items. The index is sorted in three different ways--alphabetically by data field and by data category and numerically by tape and position field--and printed in three separate volumes by sort classification.

The data derived from the surveys are contained in edited and documented public use data tapes, which are available for sale from the National Technical Information Service. HINDEX is available at no charge in either printed form or on a 5 1/4 inch floppy disk (DOS format).
