Completed project:

Homeless Youth and Children of Homeless Families in Illinois: Analysis, Educational Policy Recommendations, and Management Information System. This project, completed in August 1989 for the Illinois State Board of Education with funds from the U.S. Department of Education, consisted of a statewide telephone survey of 1,400 school districts, local government representatives, and homeless services personnel in Illinois, with a response rate of over 90%. The purpose was to determine an estimate of homeless children and youth, their level of educational attainment, and their geographic locations. Policy recommendations based on survey findings and a literature review were performed.

Near Northside Business Conditions and Satisfaction Survey. The purpose of this study for The Friendship House of

Christian Service was to assess business conditions, satisfaction/dissatisfaction, and plans among organizational/nonorganizational residents of the Near Northside in Peoria. Telephone interviews were conducted in February-March 1989 with 111 private organizations in the targeted area, with an 89% response rate.

Housing Development Assessment for the Near Northside Area. This study, completed in June 1989 for The Friendship House of Christian Service, examined the housing and neighborhood preferences and housing plans among tricounty residents. Mail questionnaires were received from 456 households in the Peoria MSA, for an 80% response rate.

Peoria MSA Consumer Sentiment. In the 12th round of this ongoing survey to measure consumer sentiment in the tricounty area (Peoria, Tazewell, and Woodford counties), 246 telephone interviews were conducted in November 1989 with residents drawn from listings in area telephone directories. The response rate was 71%.



Completed projects:

Orange County Annual Survey. This survey, sponsored by corporate, foundation, and government agency subscription, measures the perceptions and attitudes of Orange County residents toward various issues, which are selected with the assistance of a board of Orange County business and civic leaders, and also gathers basic demographic data on the residents. Issues covered in the survey completed in September 1989 included transportation, employment, housing, air quality controls, and community aftairs. RDD telephone interviews were conducted with 1,085 Orange County residents over the age of 18, with a 60% response rate.

Annual Greater Irvine Health Assessment Survey. As half of an annual study, this survey, completed in December 1989 for the Irvine Health Foundation, focused on mental health while the second half focuses on physiological health, both halves sharing a core of descriptive items. The resulting longitudinal data will provide a baseline community assessment for health planning purposes and a platform for specialized scientific studies. RDD telephone interviews using CATI were conducted with 814 Orange County adult (18+) residents (63% response rate) and with a sub-

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sample of 204 residents of the Greater Irvine Area (65% response rate).

15th Indiana Poll. As part of the 15th Indiana Poll, CSR will conduct its first Indiana Population Survey. The Poll is a statewide omnibus telephone survey of approximately 1,200 randomly chosen Hoosiers that will be conducted during late March 1990. Besides the traditional content of the Poll, the survey will ask the decennial census "person" questions and three "housing" questions, plus additional census questions if funded by clients. During the 1990s the Indiana Population Survey will be repeated to provide continuous estimates of the characteristics of the residents of Indiana.

Baccalaureate Education System Trust (BEST) Survey. This survey was conducted for BEST from November 1989 to January 1, 1990. The purpose was to evaluate the potential for prepaid tuition vouchers in Indiana. RDD-CATI interviews were conducted statewide with households who had children age 18 or younger. Study director: John Kennedy.

14th Indiana Poll. This omnibus statewide survey of 764 Indiana residents was conducted in October-December 1989. Topics included attitudes toward higher education and vocational education, investigative reporting, gambling behavior and attitudes, attitudes toward smoking behavior, and participation in voluntary activities. As part of the Poll, a set of experimental questions on the use of seat belts was asked. The Poll is an RDD-CATI survey, and the response rate was 62%.

Completed projects:

Survey of Michigan State University Students' Knowledge of International Affairs. The purpose of this survey for Ralph Smuckler, Dean of International Studies and Programs, MSU, was to replicate a 1984 survey of MSU undergraduates regarding knowledge of international affairs and measure sources of information (radio, newspapers, coursework, foreign travel). It was a longitudinal assessment of attempts to improve students' knowledge of international affairs through curriculum modification. Selfadministered questionnaires were completed in October 1989 by MSU students in classes selected randomly from within strata of courses by level. In the selected classes, 41% of instructors agreed to permit administration in their classes and 67% of total possible enrollment in those classes participated.

Student Views on Verbal Abuse and Physical Violence. This survey, conducted in November 1989 for the Vice President for Student Affairs and Services, MSU, sought to determine student perceptions of, experience with, and reactions to incidents of verbal abuse and physical violence. Included was an assessment of the role of alcohol in incidents, perceived efficacy of possible courses of actions, reporting of incidents to news media, and general campus social/academic climate. CATI interviews were conducted with a list sample of MSU students, with an oversample of black students. There were 352 completed interviews--234 nonblack and 118 black--for a 78% response rate (calling was terminated under a sponsor-imposed study completion deadline).

University of Nevada Survey--1988. Completed in November 1988 and jointly sponsored by the Center for Survey Research at UNLV and the Center for Applied Research at UN Reno with funds from the University of Nevada System, the purpose of this survey was to assess public opinion on legislative and taxation issues, social issues (women, abortion), and environmental concerns. RDD telephone interviews were conducted with adults (18+) in 1,214 households in Nevada, with an urban response rate of 75% and a rural rate of 80%.

Fire and Emergency Medical Services Survey. The purpose of this study is to evaluate the fire and emergency

medical services system and provide a master plan for future service. Questionnaires are being administered to approximately 700 volunteer fire and MES personnel in Carroll County, MD (a rural county). The final report, A Study of Fire and Emergency Medical Services in Carroll County, Maryland, is scheduled to be issued in March 1990. Study director: Steve Shandy.

Compensation Survey. The purpose of this recently completed study was to obtain comparative data on positions, salaries, and benefits from state municipal leagues nationwide and from nonprofit organizations and government agencies in Annapolis, MD, for use in evaluating the compensation plan of the Maryland Municipal League. The survey involved mail questionnaires for 48 municipal leagues, 16 nonprofit agencies, and 18 government agencies, with an overall response rate of 50%. The report is entitled Evaluation of Maryland Municipal League Personnel Compensation Plan.

Greater Cincinnati Survey--Fall 1989. Sponsored by multiple external agencies and organizations, this was a survey of public knowledge, attitudes, and behavior on a number of topics: public transportation, mental health services, police-community relations, cable television service, recycling of trash, health problems and information sources, hospital tax levy support, garbage disposal and solid waste problems, dental care, ridesharing, and abortion. RDD telephone interviews were conducted in November-December 1989 with 1,625 adults (18+) in the eight-county Greater Cincinnati metropolitan area, with a 72% response rate. Project director: George Bishop.

Quality of Academic Life Survey. Completed in the fall of 1989, this study for the Wilmington College Board of Trustees investigated various aspects of academic life at the small Quaker college in central Ohio. Resources were evaluated, as were administrators and various interest groups on campus. Also various models of campus decision making were tested. The study involved mail questionnaires for 100 full-time faculty and administrators, with an 82% response rate.

1989 Cincinnati City Council Election Proportional Representation (PR) Exit Poll. This study, completed in November 1989 for the Seasongood Foundation, was designed to

test whether using PR as an electoral method for election to the Cincinnati City Council would produce a different result than the current at-large election system. Also of interest was how various demographic groups would cast their votes under a PR system. Exit polls were conducted with 881 voters in the 1989 City Council election in Cincinnati. Fall 1989 Carolina Poll. Completed in October 1989 for the UNC School of Journalism and IRSS, this omnibus poll contained questions on a state lottery, abortion, death penalty, marijuana use, sexual attitudes, and gun ownership. Many of the questions replicated the NORC General Social Survey. RDD-CATI interviews were conducted with 634 adult (18+) North Carolinians, for a 54% response rate. Study directors: Beverly Wiggins (IRSS) and Robert L. Stevenson (School of Journalism).

Survey of Ontario Employers to Establish a Pay Equity Database. The purposes of this study for the Pay Equity Commission of Ontario are to evaluate the impact of the Pay Equity Act of 1987 in Ontario and to collect baseline information on pay levels, how they are established, and the use of job evaluation criteria that are presently applied by a wide variety of both public and private employers in Ontario. Data collection also permitted determination of the extent of wage differentials between men and women in Ontario. The survey involved telephone screening, followed by mail questionnaires for 2,250 public employers and private employers with more than 500 employees plus a sample of those with 10 or more employees. The response rate was 40%. A preliminary report was completed in December 1989.

Completed projects:

Life Course History Survey. This study, completed in September 1989 with funding from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council, sought to determine how family backgrounds and adolescent experiences influence the kinds of jobs that people choose in adult life, their deci-

sions about marriage and parenting, and how they select a place to live. CATI interviews were conducted with a sample of 570 former high school students, interviewed originally in Mississauga, Ontario, in 1974, who could be traced. The response rate was 89%.

Community Attitudes toward Educational Services in the Peel Region of Ontario. Completed in December 1989 for the Peel Board of Education, Ontario, this study sought to determine the attitudes and opinions of parents in respect to the provision of educational services in the Peel Region. CATI interviews were conducted with 550 parents of students enrolled in the Regional Municipality of Peel, with an 86% response rate.

Social Policy Panel Study. Field work is to be completed in February 1990 in this study for the School of Social Welfare, UCLA, to establish an ongoing panel of social service professionals in California as a mechanism for determining trends in presenting clients of social service agencies. The study involves mail questionnaires for a sample of 500 members of the National Association of Social Workers who reside in California.

Hazardous Waste Workers Study. The purpose of this study, to be completed in June 1990 for the Labor Center, UCLA, with funding from the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences, is to determine the level of training, skills, and knowledge of hazardous waste management among various levels of hazardous waste cleanup workers. Telephone interviews will be conducted with approximately 300 contract and subcontract workers at various "Superfund" toxic dump sites in Southern California. Project director: Jess Shatkin.

Alzheimers Caregivers Stress and Coping Study. This longitudinal study, funded by NIMH, seeks to determine the stresses experienced and the coping strategies used by child and spousal caregivers to people with Alzheimer's disease. In the second wave, completed in December 1989, face-to-face interviews were conducted with approximately 345 adult children and spousal caregivers of individuals with Alzheimer's in Los Angeles County.

Survey of Adolescent Stress and Depression. Field work was completed in October 1989 in this NIMH-funded pilot study of stress and its consequences among adolescents. Areas of study include problems in relationships with family and friends, coping mechanisms, feelings of depression, and self-concept. Face-to-face interviews were conducted with approximately 50 adolescents aged 12-17 and their parents in Los Angeles County.

Physicians Survey of Sexual-History-Taking Practices. Completed in August 1989 for the Division of Internal Medicine, UCLA, with funds from the Bureau of Health Resources, this was a survey of family and internal medicine practitioners regarding their procedures for sexual history taking for new and established patients. Telephone interviews were conducted with a list sample of 463 full-time practicing physicians in greater Los Angeles, for a 77% response rate.

Rheumatoid Arthritis Survey, Wave 3. This NIH-funded project assessed health practices and psychological well-being of respondents diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis. In the third wave, completed in August 1989, CATI interviews were conducted with 254 volunteers with RA from outpatient care facilities in greater Los Angeles, with a 93% response rate.

UCLA Preventive Health Behaviors Study, Wave 5. This study for the Jonsson Comprehensive Cancer Center, funded by the National Cancer Institute, is an evaluation of a smoking cessation intervention targeted for women in an HMO. Interviews take place every six months. In the 5th wave in May-June 1989, CATI interviews were conducted in greater Los Angeles with 1,240 female adults in a primary care facility who enrolled in the study; the response rate was 90%.

Targeted KAB Survey of Chronic Drug Users. Sponsored by the AIDS Activities Coordinating Office, Philadelphia Department of Public Health, with a grant from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control, this study, expected to be completed by June 1990, seeks to pinpoint gaps in cocaine users' knowledge about AIDS, to assess the extent to which they engage in risky behavior, and to learn about the drug user's mindset so that appropriate educational mes-

sages can be tailored to it. The study involves face-toface interviews with 300 drug users in five treatment programs in different parts of Philadelphia whose primary drug of abuse is cocaine (or crack). Study director: Jay A. Mattlin.

Irish and Puerto Ricans in New York City. In this NIAAA-funded study, to be completed in mid-1991 for the Hispanic Research Center, Fordham University, face-to-face interviews will be conducted with 500 Irish and 500 Puerto Ricans in New York City (50% males, 50% females) to compare drinking behavior between the two ethnic groups. Study director: Karol Krotki,

New Beneficiary Reinterview. Field work is scheduled for August-December 1990 in this followup of new Social Security beneficiaries first interviewed in person by ISR in 1982. Reinterviews will be conducted nationwide with 15,000 of the original 18,599 beneficiaries--14,000 by face-to-face interview and 1,400 by telephone in a methodological component. Sponsored by the Social Security Administration, the purpose of the reinterviews is to assess the effect of life transition events such as retirement, widowhood, and institutionalization on economic status.

Vietnam Era Twins Study of Drug Use and Dependency. This NIDA-funded national study for Ming T. Tsuang, Harvard Medical School, involves recontacting the Vietnam Era Registry Twins for a one-hour interview comprised of segments of the NIMH Diagnostic Interview Schedule, personality assessment items, and profiles of past and present drug use practices. Special attention will be devoted to describing drug use specific to the Vietnam experience. Subsamples of siblings and sibling-parent pairs will also be interviewed to measure potential family/environmental influences on the Twins' drug use and dependency. CATI interviewing is expected to begin in September 1990 and be completed in February 1992 with approximately 8,800 twins and with 500 siblings and sibling-parent pairs, respectively. Survey of Young Adults and Families. This longitudinal study, scheduled for completion in the summer of 1990 for Denise Kandel, Columbia University and the New York State Psychiatric Institute, with funding from NIDA, focuses on the evolution of drug use among a sample of young adults first studied as high school students in 1971, as well as on drug use by their children, in the context of family interactions and other life experiences. Face-to-face interviews are being conducted worldwide with 2,028 persons in 1,222 households, including men and women now aged 33-34, who constitute a random sample of former New York State high school students followed since 1971 and also their spouses/partners and children aged 9-17.

National Surveys of Men and Women. Face-to-face field work will be done in spring/summer 1990 in these two na-

tional studies for Koray Tanfer, Battelle Memorial Institute, funded by NICHD. The National Survey of Women is a followup of 1,620 young unmarried women to assess sexual, contraceptive, and fertility changes that may have been influenced by AIDS and other STDs. The National Survey of Men will interview 4,000 men on similar topics, with emphasis on their condom behavior.

California Conservation Corps (CCC) Youth Followup Survey. Funded by the Ford and Rockefeller Foundations and scheduled for completion in July 1990, this survey for Public/Private Ventures will measure the long-term effects of CCC participation. In 1983-84 youth entering the CCC and a comparison group of youth who contacted the California Employment Development Division were interviewed. In the current survey, telephone interviews will be conducted with 1,236 low-income adults (now in their mid-20s) in California. The questionnaire includes a job history, questions about drug and alcohol use and criminal behavior, and attitudes toward conservation and voluntary participation. Study director: Susan Sprachman.

Minnesota DNR Public Opinion Poll. The purposes of this survey for the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, completed in April 1989, were to measure the importance of 33 types of outdoor recreation facilities and need for additional facilities and to assess concern for statewide and regional environmental issues and support for potential DNR and regional programs. RDD telephone interviews were conducted with 2,403 adults in Minnesota, with a 67% response rate.

Solvent Waste Survey. Completed in November 1989 for the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, this survey sought to understand better the amount of solvent waste being produced and what disposal methods are being used and to determine how to reduce the amount of waste produced. Mail questionnaires were received from 401 businesses in Minnesota listed as solvent waste generators, for a 68% response rate.

Business Ownership Survey. This survey, completed in January 1990 for the Minnesota Department of Administration, sought to determine the state proportion of minority and female-owned businesses. Mail questionnaires in the form of double postcards were returned by 8,611 small businesses in Minnesota, with a 58% response rate after two mailings.

Female and Minority Business Owner Survey. The purposes of this survey, completed in January 1990 for the Minnesota Department of Administration, were to understand better the problems faced in operating a business and to determine the amount of discrimination faced by these owners. The survey involved mail questionnaires from 674 minority- and female-owned businesses in Minnesota, with a 64% response rate (after adjustment determined by followup telephone calls to nonrespondents). Citizen's Social and Political Participation in America. Sponsored and funded by NSF and the Ford, Hewlett, and Spencer Foundations, this is a study of the ways in which citizens participate in the political and social life of American society. Scheduled for completion in July 1990, data will be collected on who participates and who does not, how they differ, and the reasons that some participate and others do not. About 2,500 respondents nationwide are being selected from a previously conducted RDD-CATI screening interview of about 15,000 screened for levels of participation and minority status. They will be interviewed face-to-face on their political activities and attitudes.

Influence of Differing Family Environments on Siblings and Twins. The purpose of this research, to be completed in May 1990 with funding from NIMH and the W.T. Grant Foundation, is to investigate the influence of different family environments on normal and pathological development of children and the influence of varying genetic relationships. Using screening by RDD and from consumer mail panels, a sample of 600 families with full, half, and quarter sibling types will be taken along with a control group of about 200. Similar investigations will be taken with twins found in the sample families. Measures of direct observation of family interactions will allow estimates of both genetic and family interaction processes. Measures of conduct disorders and depression and of competent development will also be taken. Survey methods include face-to-face interviews, selfadministered questionnaires from two teachers of each

child, and nine videotaped segments of family interaction. Principal investigators: David Reiss (George Washington University), Mavis Heatherington (University of Virginia), and Robert Plomin (Pennsylvania State University); NORC project director: Alisu Schoua-Glusberg.

Medical Professionals' Attitudes toward AIDS. Scheduled for July 1990-September 1991 and conducted for the Columbia University School of Public Health with NIH funding, this is a survey of physicians' and nurses' knowledge, attitudes, practices, and career plans as related to AIDS. Specific questions will address knowledge about AIDS (transmission, epidemiology, precautionary guidelines, caring for HIV-infected patients) and attitudes (willingness to treat AIDS patients, including volunteering, avoiding, and duty toward treatment). In 25 states (with oversampling in San Francisco and New York City), telephone interviews will be conducted with a sample of 1,600 physicians in practice (including internists, surgeons, and pediatricians) drawn from AMA tapes, and mail questionnaires will be sent to a sample of 2,500 registered nurses drawn from state lists. Principal investigator: John Columbotos (Columbia University); NORC project director; Richard Rubin.

1990 General Social Survey. In addition to repeating many items in its basic time series, the 1990 GSS contains an extensive set of supplemental items. First, the International Social Survey Program's module on the role of government replicates key components of the 1985 module. The main topics covered are civil liberties, economic regulation, and social welfare. Second, the topical module in 1990 is on race relations and includes items on stereotyping, social distance, welfare, and affirmative action. Third, Andrew Greeley continues his support of questions on religion, and NORC repeats its items on AIDS and sexual behavior. Finally, the National Commission on Children adds questions on child rearing and parental responsibility, and Eleanor Singer sponsors questions on genetic engineering. GSS Director: Tom W. Smith.

Victim Services Study. The purpose of this study, conducted in May-July 1989 for the National Institute of Justice, was to determine the kinds of problems that crime victims experience, the types of help that they receive, both formally and informally, and their level of satisfaction with the help that they receive. Telephone interviews were conducted with a total of 493 adults (drawn from police files) who had been the victims of crimes (including robbery, burglary, and assault)--93 in Evanston, IL (72% response rate); 115 in Lexington, KY (83%); 120 in Tucson, AZ (66%); and 125 in Rochester, NY (66%).

1989 Alumni Survey of 1967-77 Graduates. Completed in December 1989 for Alumni Relations, Northwestern University, this survey gathered lifestyle information about 1967-77 NU graduates in order to plan programs and services to better serve alumni needs and interests. Telephone interviews were completed nationwide with a sample of 499 graduates from across all graduates listed on the University database from 1967-77. The response rate was 71%. Study coordinator: Alyssa J. Pinks.

Texas Highways Magazine Readership Survey. Scheduled for completion in June 1990, this study for Texas Highways Magazine, Texas State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, will examine the reading and travel habits of Texas Highways subscribers. The survey is designed to provide guidance in planning future issues. Mail questionnaires will be sent to 1,850 Texans who read the magazine. Coordinator: Veronica Inchauste.

Virginia Statewide AIDS Needs Assessment: HIV Seropositivity Study of Adult Inmates. The purposes of this
study for the Virginia Department of Corrections and the
Virginia Department of Health, with funds from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and the Virginia General Assembly, were to measure the seropositivity rate of incoming
inmates in state correctional facilities and to gather information about risk behaviors and educational needs. The
study, completed in November 1989, involved questionnaires self-administered to groups of newly admitted
inmates at five Virginia adult state correctional facilities
and HIV blood tests. The responses comprised 580 questionnaires and 921 HIV tests.

The Level of Competition, Availability, and Affordability in the Commercial Liability Insurance Industry. Sponsored by the Bureau of Insurance, State Corporation Commission of Virginia and completed in November 1989, this study sought to determine the experience and perspectives of several different populations regarding the market for commercial and professional liability insurance in Virginia. The survey method was principally mail, with responses from 1,102 consumers of potentially troubled lines of commercial and professional insurance (42% response rate), 2,241 other commercial and liability insurance consumers (40%), 164 municipalities (51%), and 669 insurance agents (44%).

Fall 1989 Commonwealth Poll. Completed in October 1989, this omnibus survey measured public opinion regarding the abortion issue and the upcoming statewide elections. RDD-

CATI interviews were conducted with 805 adult residents of Virginia (451 likely voters), for a 66% response rate. Poll director: Scott Keeter.

University Center for Social and Urban Research University of Pittsburgh

(121 University Place, Pittsburgh, PA 15260; 412-624-5442)

Feasibility Study of the Health Impact of Air Pollution in the Clairton-Glassport Area. This survey, to be completed in February 1990 for the Environmental Protection Agency, is intended to update the demographic profile of households within the Clairton-Glassport area of Allegheny County, PA. RDD-CATI interviews were conducted with a sample of 500 residents of the area, with a 65% response rate.

Principal investigator: Joseph P. Costantino (Graduate School of Public Health).

Neighborhood Business District Market Studies: Consumer Surveys. Scheduled for completion in June 1990 for the City of Pittsburgh Department of Planning, this is a multi-year project to assess consumer shopping patterns. Telephone interviews are being conducted with 3,700 residents of Pittsburgh. A regional survey concerning shopping patterns in Downtown Pittsburgh was also performed.

Principal investigator: James P. DeAngelis (Graduate School of Public and International Affairs).

Victims of Residential Burglary. The purposes of this study, scheduled for completion in the summer of 1991 for NIMH, are (1) to examine the choice of initial coping strategies (both behavioral and psychological) employed by residential victims and the role played by other in the decision process; (2) to study the determinants of burglary victims' short-term and long-term recovery and the role played by others in this process; and (3) to examine the decision process of informal aid providers ("consultants") and the impact of their interaction with the victim on their short-term and long-term emotional health. RDD-CATI interviews will be conducted with 1,500 residents of the Pittsburgh region. Principal investigator: Martin Greenberg (Psychology).

Completed project:

An Evaluation of the Public's Perceptions of the Health and Environmental Risks with the January 2, 1988, Ashland Oil Spill. The purpose of this study, completed in September 1988 for the Ashland Oil Co., was to provide decision makers information regarding the perceptions and concerns of those persons who were affected by the January 2, 1988, Ashland Oil spill in order to facilitate emergency planning and improve future emergency response capabilities. RDD telephone interviews were conducted with 400 persons living in Allegheny County, PA, with a 65% response rate. Project director: Jeanette Trauth.

Urban Research Institute University of Louisville

Care for Aging Persons with Mental Retardation. Scheduled for completion in May 1990, this study for Cedar Lake Lodge. Inc., seeks to assess and plan for the future needs of the mentally retarded residents of Cedar Lake Lodge as they age. Approximately 240-250 face-to-face interviews will be conducted in La Grange, KY.

Completed projects:

Jefferson County Social Services Survey. The purpose of this survey, completed in December 1989 for the Jefferson County Department of Social Services, was to assess the public's attitudes toward the provision of social services by county government to the public. RDD telephone interviews were conducted with 600 persons in Jefferson County, KY, for a 54% response rate.

Principal investigator: C. Theodore Koebel.

Study of Services to Kentuckians with Developmental Disabilities. Completed in December 1989 for the National Developmental Disabilities Planning Council through the Kentucky council, URI surveyed people with developmental disabilities in Kentucky, analyzed the services provided to them, and wrote a report to be used as the basis for the council's recommendations to the Governor and legislature of Kentucky and to be Kentucky's contribution to a national study. Face-to-face interviews were conducted with 300 disabled clients and/or their caregivers. In addition, mail questionnaires were used to survey service agencies. Principal investigator: Gordon Scott Bonham.

Emergency Medical Diversion Study. The purposes of this study for the Louisville Hospital Council, completed in November 1989, were (1) to collect information on the problem of 11 Louisville and Jefferson County, KY, hospitals with emergency rooms that periodically have no beds for critically ill patients and have to inform the emergency medical services to divert patients to other hospitals and (2) to provide recommendations to alleviate this problem. Face-toface interviews were conducted with key personnel at two county and three urban hospitals; E.R. staff surveyed 4,766 patients walking into emergency rooms; 530 E.R. and nursing supervisors completed forms regarding staffing and bed availability; and 30 emergency medical technicians completed forms on diverted bed patients. Response rates were 50% for the face-to-face interviews and 68% for the staff and bed availability information.

Wisconsin Survey Research Laboratory University of Wisconsin

Intellectual Freedom Study. This study for Dianne Hopkins, School of Library and Informational Studies, UW-Madison, sought to ascertain the extent and nature of the criticism of school library materials received from the community. The study involves mail questionnaires distributed in fall 1989 and winter 1990. Librarians in 6.500 public schools (K-8) in the U.S. are being surveyed to see if community criticism of school library materials has occurred. The second survey will be done of those schools that report such occurrences.

A Survey of Older Citizens. The purpose of this study for Sandy Wright, Bureau of Aging, Wisconsin Department of Health and Social Services, is to obtain data on the attitudes and health and economic status of older persons in Wisconsin. RDD-CATI interviews and processing will be done in February-April 1990 to obtain a total of 2,250 interviews-320 in each of five regions in Wisconsin and 650 in Milwaukee.

Sleep Survey: II. Scheduled for completion in March 1990 for Jerry Young, Department of Preventive Medicine, UW-Madison, the purpose of this survey is to obtain data on sleeping patterns. The study involves mail questionnaires from approximately 1,100 current employees of the State of Wisconsin. After reviewing the questionnaire data, the sponsor will invite certain respondents to participate in further ways in the research.

Police Foundation Madison Followup Interview. This study for Sampson Annon of the Police Foundation involves a followup interview with respondents interviewed in person about one year previously by Police Foundation interviewers for the Madison Police Department survey. CATI interviews are being conducted in January-February 1990 with about 1,150 residents of the City of Madison.

Health Insurance Coverage and Noncoverage in Three Wisconsin Counties. The purpose of this survey for the Office of Management and Policy, Wisconsin Department of Health and Social Services, is to obtain detailed information on the health insurance coverage (and noncoverage) of the residents of three Wisconsin counties. In February-March 1990, RDD-CATI screening interviews will be conducted with approximately 4,500 households to produce about 420 individuals without health insurance and 240 households where all residents are covered; then these households will be interviewed to collect data on all household members.

Statewide Survey of Attitudes Toward and Knowledge About AIDS. Sponsored by Dr. James Vergeront, Director, Wisconsin AIDS/HIV Program, this is the third statewide survey of Wisconsin adults to ascertain what the public knows about and their attitudes toward AIDS. RDD-CATI interviews are being conducted statewide in January-February 1990 with a cross section of 500 adults plus 200 blacks and 100 Hispanics.

Health Risk Factor Surveillance Survey for States of Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, and Connecticut. In this survey for the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and the departments of health of the four individual states, RDD-CATI interviews are taken in each state during a stated period each month of the year to obtain data on the incidence of various forms of health risk behavior. The interview is conducted with a randomly selected adult in each household. The monthly number of completed interviews varies from 100 for Wisconsin (for a total of 1,200 in 1990) to 200 for Pennsylvania (for a total of 2,400).

IRSS Public Opinion Index

The Institute for Research in Social Science at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill has developed an electronic index of its public opinion data holdings. The easy-to-use system allows users who wish to locate public opinion data to search for variables by words or combinations of words included in the question, as well as by date and survey source. The index displays the full text of the question, along with information about how to locate the study codebook. In some cases, frequency distributions are also displayed.

Data from the 1989 General Social Survey (GSS) have been added to the cumulative database maintained by the Roper Center at the University of Connecticut. This file has ISSP variables on the level of contact with various relatives and friends and questions on where people would seek help when faced with difficulties such as a need for money, emotional support, or career advice. The Zentralarchiv has also compiled a merged tape for the 1987 ISSP social inequality module, which contains questions on support for the welfare state and leveling programs, beliefs about the factors regulating opportunity, reasons for income inequality, level of social conflict between groups, estimates of the current and preferred income level of selected occu-

pations, and information on personal intergenerational mobility. The countries covered include the U.S., Great Britain, Ireland, Italy, Germany, and Austria. The two tapes are available to users from ICPSR.
